Lincoln County Will Advertise

At the meeting of the Toledo Development League Saturday evening Toledo's proportion of the \$970 was raised for advertising Lincoln county by the Sunset Magazine company, advertising department of the Harriman system. Toledo's portion of the amount to be raised was \$300. C. B. Crosno, secretary of the League, was instructed to notify Mr. Wells of the Sunset company of the League's acceptance of the proposition.

Newport Commercial Club at its meeting Thursday evening pledged \$300, and representatives from Elk City, Waldport and Salmon River pledged the balance. Friday afternoon J. M. Scott, Assistant General Passenger Agent of the S. P., Col. Robert A. Miller of Portland, and W. B. Wells of the Sunset Magazine, and several prominent men of Newport came up from Newport on the launch Oregon to confer with the business men here. A meeting of the citizens was called to meet at the courthouse in the evening, at which the above-named gentlemen spoke and outlined the advertising proposition. On a vote being taken at this meeting our people voiced a sentiment in favor of the company's proposition.

The proposition of the Southern Pacific company is as follows:

They will issue a 32-page booklet fully illustrated with handsome colored cover; carry a half page advertisement one year in the Sunset Magazine; insert a three-page illustrated article in same periodical; also to issue 10,000 of the 32-page booklets supplement them with 10,000 descriptive folders and later issue a second edition of 10,000 leaflets, and besides all this the Southern Pacific would, through its various bureaus, undertake the distribution of most or all of this matter. The total cost to Lincoln county is to be only \$970; \$250 to be paid on the delivery of the booklets and the balance in installments of \$60 per month.

There is no locality on earth that has more natural resources than has Lincoln county, Oregon, and there is no locality that has advertised so very little as has Lincoln county. All we need is more people and all that is required to get more people is to tell them of this, the best spot on earth. 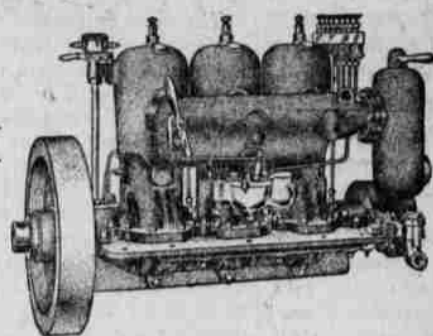
