The bill providing for four months leave of absence, to homesteaders during the winter, was reported adversely by the House committee after having passed the Senate. This would have been a great boon to homesteaders, and especially on the Siletz, allowing them to get out of the timber during the winter, as it is too stormy to work and during the bad storms it is dangerous to be in the timber.

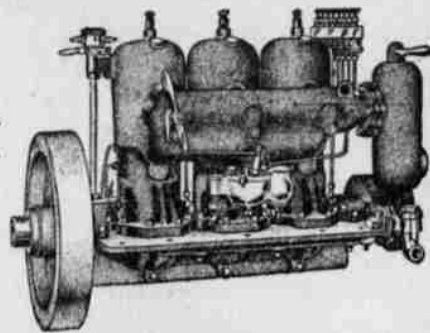
No announcement made in years has been more interesting to the state at large than the publication of the plans of the Oregon Electric Railway Company, which mean a system aggregating 381 miles in length, and reaching the principal towns of the entire Willamette valley, with an extension to the coast as well. McMinnville, Newberg, Dallas, Eugene, Albany, Cascadia, Hillsboro, and Tillamook, with innumerable other communities, are included. The line between Portland and Salem has received such excellent patronage that on several occasions it has been necessary to revise the schedule to accommodate additional trains. In the Eastern states the multiplication of trolley lines has decreased the passenger traffic on the steam roads, but the latter have felt so marked an increase in freight traffic that the passenger loss has been more than compensated in earnings.

It will be the fifteenth day of May before the new eight-story steel building of the Portland Commercial Club will be ready for occupancy. The Club will formally open its new quarters on June 12, the anniversary of the laying of its corner stone. The cost of the building and its furnishings has been \$434,000.

The Commercial Club of Walla Walla, Washington, has passed resolutions urging the railroad companies to grant a one-fare rate for the round trip, by continuous passage, between points in interior Washington and Oregon and the seaside resorts of these two states. It is understood that the Club favors a higher rate when stop-over privileges are allowed. The Walla Walla Club has requested the commercial bodies of Eastern Oregon, Washington and Idaho, as well as the Commercial Club of Portland, to pass similar resolutions. It is hoped that favorable action may be taken by all, as the people of the interior should be given the opportunity of visiting the coast especially during the summer months, at the least possible cost.
