Sixty expert timber cruisers started to cruise the timber lands of Tillamook county Monday morning, so the Assessor may be able to reach a more equitable assessment of the timbered districts.—Tillamook Herald.

We have hopes that in the near future we may be able to publish as a news item something similar to the above, only substituting the word Lincoln in the place of Tillamook. Our county Court at its last session received bids for cruising our timber, but took ten days to consider the proposition. They have concluded to wait a while before going into it. Undoubtedly the matter will be taken up again at their next term and the work of cruising commenced.

The Court is unanimous in wanting the timber of this county cruised, but as in all matters where a considerable amount of money is involved, they want to act carefully.

This cold, rainy weather is holding some things back, but it is helping the dairymen. Just imagine snow at this season such as they are having in some of the eastern states. A little warm rain is better, isn't it.

The Newport News-Reporter, A. B. Clark and Wm. Mathews editors, made its appearance last Friday. The first issue of the new paper under the new management was a good one and we predict that Messrs. Clark & Mathews will make each subsequent issue a little better than the preceding one.

At a recent meeting of our citizens to learn the advertising proposition of the S. P. Company agents, the subject of making a flower garden in the vacant space south of the depot was brought up. This would be a great improvement to the appearance of the grounds, and a fine advertisement of our mild climate. The plan as suggested is to build a strong wire fence around the plot and set out roses and other flowers so that passengers passing through on the trains can see our roses blooming in almost every month in the year.

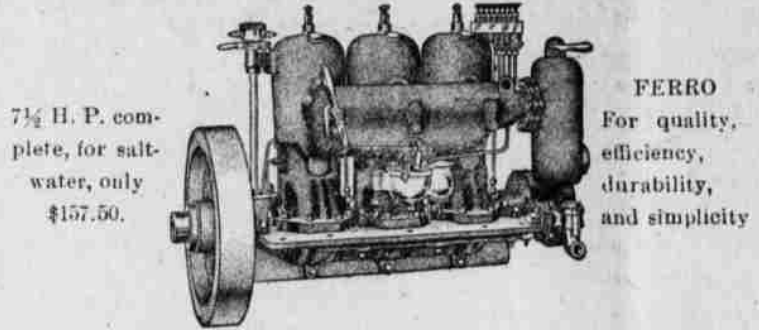
