W. H. Taft of Ohio for President; James S. Sherman of New York for Vice President, is the result of the National Republican convention at Chicago last week.

The public appreciates the new train schedule between here and Albany. The trains are due at Toledo as follows: Mixed train, east-bound 7:30 a. m.; mixed, west-bound, 12:55 p. m.; passenger, east-bound 2:45; p. m.; passenger, west-bound 5:02 p. m. Sunday special from Albany arrives 11:18 a. m. returning, 6:27 p. m.

One of the most celebrated land fraud cases in the history of the country came to an end in New York Monday, when F. A. Hyde and J. H. Schneider were found guilty, and J. A. Benson and Henry Diamond found not guilty of unlawfully conspiring to defraud the government out of public lands in Southern Oregon and California.

Today a big force of workmen are employed on the new depot site. The two northern tracks have been taken up and excavations are being made. Everything now points to actual construction work on the long awaited structure. The new depot will be a union depot for all the trains on the S. P. and C. & E. roads, and will present a decidedly metropolitan appearance when completed.—Albany Herald.

The early morning train south-bound from Portland takes the Oregonian to Albany in time to catch the Sunday excursion train for this bay, arriving here at 11 o'clock. Now if arrangements can be made by the Oregonian publishers to send the paper on the new daily morning train from Albany it would be greatly appreciated by the people all along the line of the C. & E.

English walnuts have become the prevailing fad in the line of tree planting in many parts of the Willamette valley, where the prune craze held sway 15 to 20 years ago, and many prune trees are being uprooted to make room for those producing the toothsome nut, says the Portland Telegram.

The walnut tree begins to bear in the fourth year, and is supposed to become profitable the sixth, although it is generally understood that the grower must wait 10 to 12 years for the best returns. After the tenth year the business of walnut growing is said to pay better than any other agricultural enterprise in the state. The trees to be set out in the tract in question are to be three years old, and so are to begin to pay for the trouble and expense within three or four years of the time of planting.

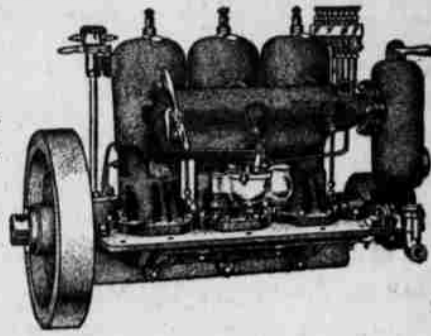
