The Republican Party.

Charles Walton was sentenced to three years in the pen for shooting policeman Nelson in a streetcar holdup in Portland September 1, 1904.

J. C. Hayter for seventeen years editor of the Polk County Observer has leased the paper to Allgood & Collins, who have been connected with the paper for some time. Mr. Hayter retires on account of his health. The Observer is one of the best country papers in Oregon.

Portland's exports for the fiscal year ending June 30 were nearly \$6,000,000 greater than for the preceding year, says the Oregonian. The number of vessels entering at the local custom-house was 150 greater and the number clearing 120 greater than for the year before. Collections were again in excess of \$1,000,000, and fell behind those of the preceding year much less than was expected when the panic last fall cut down imports and forced retrenchment all along the line.

Rear Admiral Charles M. Thomas died of apoplexy in Del Monte, California, July 4. Rear Admiral Thomas was second in command of the Atlantic battleship fleet from Hampton roads to San Francisco, was in command of the fleet for five days while at San Francisco, when he retired and was succeeded by Rear Admiral Sperry.

A Sixty-two story building is to be erected in New York by the Equitable Life Assurance society. This building will reach a height of 990 feet above the pavement.
