William Jennings Bryan since his first nomination for the presidency has spoken 18,000,000 words. Here is a rough estimate of what he has been doing during the past 12 years: He has each year delivered 250 speeches, traveled 25,000 miles, spoken on an average half an hour each time and his audiences have averaged 1000 persons. The totals that result from these figures are enormous. They show that, including his trip around the world in 1906, Mr. Bryan has traveled 300,000 miles, has addressed 3,000,000 people, has spoken 3000 times and has talked 1500 hours or a little more than 62 days, or 90,000 minutes. Assuming that his average enunciation per minute is 200 words, his entire output must be approximately 18,000,000 words.

That's going some, but we believe Mr. Bryan will have to go a much swifter gait than that to land in the Presidential chair.

What appears to be the only successful way to prepare loganberries for the market is to dry them. Experiments prove that canning is a failure unless the fruit is put in glass jars, which is expensive. These berries dry out about 75 per cent, but retain their form and color and can be packed and shipped to advantage. It is estimated the cost of drying amounts to about seven cents per crate. There is a demand for the dried fruit. There is no country on earth that will produce a better grade or more berries to the acre than here in Lincoln county, but as there is very little local demand for them they have not been a profitable crop.

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., has compiled a few "don'ts" for the guidance of his Sunday school class. Here are some of them:

"Don't loan money to anybody without taking a note and charging interest. If a man asks for a temporary loan of \$5 or \$10, promising to repay it in a few days and never intending to do so, it is your religious duty to refuse him.

"Don't loan money to friends, or you'll lose them.

"Don't take Christ's command to give to the poor literally. It was never so intended. Give them sympathy and advice, but keep your money in your pocket, unless you get a note in return and are certain of receiving both principal and interest."

Oregon through its next legislature is to adopt the Oklahoma state banking law, the keynote of which is deposits guaranteed to customers of every bank in the state, provided the efforts of A. W. Orton of Multnomah county are of any avail. Led by the experiences of the past year in the banking circles of the state and by the fact that the present banking law of the state is vague, ambiguous, incomplete and in many cases ineffective. Mr. Orton has decided to concentrate his efforts during the coming session towards putting the Oklahoma banking law on the statute books in place of those now there. The Oklahoma law was incorporated in the constitution of that state about a year ago when the territory was admitted to statehood, and was the result of long and careful considera-

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tion by the framers of the constitution. Its essential feature is the protection of the depositors of any and all banks of the state, which protection is secured by means of a reserve fund kept on deposit with the state treasurer and made up of contributions from all banks doing business in the state. It is believed this will provide absolute protection to depositors and guard them against loss or delay in payment in the event of suspension or failure of a bank no matter its size or strength. According to the provisions of the law each bank is required to pay from time to time a certain percentage of its total deposits into the state treasury. This percentage is fixed by law and at all times each bank must have on deposit with the state treasurer such an amount as will meet the ratio. The Total fund created by these proportional assessments is invested in safe and steady paying bonds and other gilt-edged securities, so that in times of financial prosperity it will become a steadily increasing fund to be held in reserve against the time of financial depression and need.
