Joe Ludwig Suicides.

Last Monday morning at about 5 o'clock, Joe Ludwig, aged 60, committed suicide by shooting himself in the head with a shotgun, at Otter Rock where he has been living the past year. He had made arrangements for his death by carrying his bed out in front of his cabin, then writing a note bidding all good bye, placed the muzzle of the shotgun to his head and pulled the trigger blowing the whole top off his head. Thus ending the earthly troubles of Joe Ludwig.

The body was found about 8 o'clock by Mrs. Cody, one of the campers at the resort, as she was going down the trail to the agate beach. The report of a gun was heard at 5 o'clock in the morning when undoubtedly the deed was done.

The body was brought to Toledo Tuesday afternoon and buried in the grave previously prepared by the deceased at his little home in this city.

Mr. Ludwig was a widower and had a daughter in the insane asylum at Salem. He had lived alone in Toledo for the past twenty years, until about a year ago, when he bought a lot at Otter Rock and built a cabin and has resided there since. He was a shoemaker but would spend days and weeks at a time alone in the woods hunting and trapping. He left a little home in Toledo and one at Otter Rock and a few days ago he deposited money in the Lincoln County Bank here to pay burial expenses.

He was honest, truthful, sober and industrious, was honored and respected by everyone.

Killed by Falling Tree.

Mrs. S. Bemis, a widow, living on a homestead six miles below Siletz, was instantly killed about 4:30 o'clock Wednesday morning by an old tree falling across her cabin, crushing her life out.

W. H. Olin an old man who was working on the place hurriedly cleared away the wreckage and pulled her out from under the log, then sent a messenger for Dr. Hawkins at Siletz and Dr. Burgess of Toledo, but long before either doctor arrived the unfortunate woman was dead.

E. Olson, a brother of the deceased, brought the body to Toledo and an undertaker at Albany was sent for to prepare the body for shipment to the old home at St. Paul, Minnesota.
