To Correct a False Impression.

The impression seems to stick in the narrow craniums of certain persons in this community that undersigned advocated local option, influenced voters in its favor, etc., in order to obtain a complete monopoly of the liquor business of this place. Furthermore I am accused of showing inconsistency and playing the hypocrite in my attitude as a man of temperate habits and dispenser of medicines liable to intoxicate.

As to the first accusation, I will nail it as a lie by challenging anyone to prove I ever publicly or privately advocated local option or prohibition for the purpose of influencing anybody's vote. Anybody who knows me knows that my political beliefs favor neither local option nor prohibition. I don't hide my political light under a bushel. I lived 4 years in a prohibition state. I am well acquainted with the conditions before and after. I have frequently been asked how the law operates and is taken by the inhabitants, replying by simply presenting facts that anyone may verify. It is no more inconsistent or hypocritical for me to deal in intoxicants than for Mr. Stewart or Mr. Lewis to deal in tobacco in unrestricted quantities. Neither of these men make personal use of it nor do they permit its use by any member of their family.

Being myself a consistent temperate man in everything, my public and private attitude towards the use or abuse of these things cannot be otherwise than as stated.

My training as a druggist naturally leads me to place spirituous liquors in the category of remedial agents—medicines—which in my opinion is the proper classification, and would like to have the public so consider them.

As you all know, I am not given to finding fault, I simply desire to correct a false impression.
