This would make it necessary for our trainmen to move from Yaquina to Albany. And if the S. P. and Westside trains don't change their time tables we will have no out side connections and it will consume two days for our people on the Bay to reach Independence, Monmouth, Salem and other Valley points.

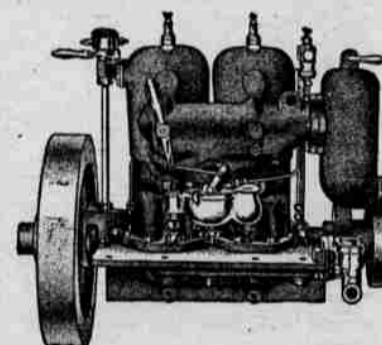
