**Lincoln County Folders Here.**

Secretary Crosno of the Toledo Development League, Wednesday, received the first lot of Lincoln county folders printed by the Sunset Magazine Company—the publicity department of the Harriman railroads. Secretary Crosno received 2,000 of this first lot of 10,000 to be printed. Newport received 2,000; Elk City and Waldport 1,000 each.

The booklet of 32 pages to be issued by this same company will arrive soon, and later on another lot of 10,000 folders will be issued, besides sending this 6,000 leaflets to this county the company has sent to their publicity bureau at Omaha 4,000 copies to be distributed all over the United States to homeseekers.

This is in accordance with the contract with the Sunset Magazine company by the Development Leagues at Toledo, Newport, Elk City and Waldport last Spring, in which these leagues agreed to pay the Sunset company \$970 for this advertising. The money was soon raised, and now we have the first installment of the leaflets.

The leaflet is ten pages 3x6 inches. It gives the colonist rates now on between all parts of the East and Canada to Lincoln county. It gives a 2-page map showing all the railroads under the Harriman system, with plain instructions to the homeseeker how to find Lincoln county on the map. Then a three-page descriptive write-up of the resources and advantages of this county. It is a good write-up as far as it goes and will do much in bringing to this county new settlers.

These folders are for distribution and everyone in the county should make a practice of sending one of these leaflets in every letter sent to the East. Call on one of the secretaries of these four leagues and get a supply and distribute them wherever you think it will be the means of bringing a settler to this, the best country on earth.

You will be surprised at the great variety of fruit and vegetables grown in this county when you see the exhibits at the carnival.

We will soon have the morning and evening train service again. Then we may again expect to see travel to the Bay country this winter.

The school children will have a day at the coming fruit and vegetable carnival. Contests will be held in different lines and prizes awarded.

If Mr. O'Brien's visit to this county last week no more than to change the train schedule back to the old morning and evening service it will be a great help to the county.

At the regular meeting of the Toledo Development League last Tuesday evening it was decided to hold the Fruit and Vegetable Carnival at the courthouse grounds, as it would be handier to reach than the ball grounds.

Mr. Harriman apparently means business about building railroads in Oregon says the Portland Journal. He gives positive assurance about the road into Central Oregon. That of itself, after all these years of waiting is a good deal. It means a revolutionary development of a large portion of the state, and its effects will be felt in other parts of the state, especially in Portland. The road to Tillamook within a year or two seems also assured. From all indication its construction has been definitely decided upon. This will be no less important than the Central Oregon road, possibly even more important to Portland. The line from Natron to Weed, avoiding the heavier and more tortuous grades of the Siskiyous, will without doubt also be constructed in the near future. This will not only give an easier line to California but will also open up a large new territory to this city. The road from Drain to Coos Bay Mr. Harriman does not promise or talk about so encouragingly. He wants to know whether, for 10 years it can earn 4 per cent on \$5,000,000, and we believe he can be shown that it will.

The building of these roads within the next two years or so means great things for Oregon. It means the expenditure here of perhaps \$15,000,000 or \$20,000,000 in railroad construction, and that means better times for everybody. It means a greatly increased population, and such a growth and development of Oregon as it has never witnessed. It means tens of thousands more producers, a vastly increased agricultural output, hundreds of new manufactories, more local electric lines, larger and more vigorous towns, a state rapidly growing at least toward its proper and destined greatness.

Mr. Harriman's promise spells prosperity. He soured his remarks with no pessimism. He said he could now get the necessary money and would build. He made no condition about the result of the presidential election. However that goes, Oregon is going to be all right. And once it gets the booming forward start that this railroad building will give it, its development will continue indefinitely.
