Notice to Taxpayers.

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Equalization will meet at the office of the County Judge, at Toledo, Oregon, on Monday the 19th day of October, 1908, for the purpose of examining and correcting the 1908 assessment rolls. The law requires that all petitions or applicants for the reduction of a particular assessment shall be made in writing, verified by the oath of the applicant or his attorney, and must be filed with the Board during the FIRST WEEK IT IS BY LAW REQUIRED TO BE IN SESSION, and any petition or application not so made, verified, and filed shall not be considered or acted upon by the Board, and notice is hereby given to each and every taxpayer assessed upon said rolls, that if he fails to appear before said Board, or files with said Board a verified petition, during the first week of its session, he will be unable to obtain relief before the County Court, as the Court will hereafter absolutely refuse to allow any rebate of any taxes paid upon the 1908 tax rolls, for the reason that the law makes the Board of Equalization the proper authority for correcting said rolls.

Waldport's 115 votes will be increased at the November election. A number of those who have not previously registered are doing so.

The Waldport Lumber Company has purchased a complete pile driver outfit and will soon have it in operation. This has been needed on the bay for a long time.
