Toledo School Notes.

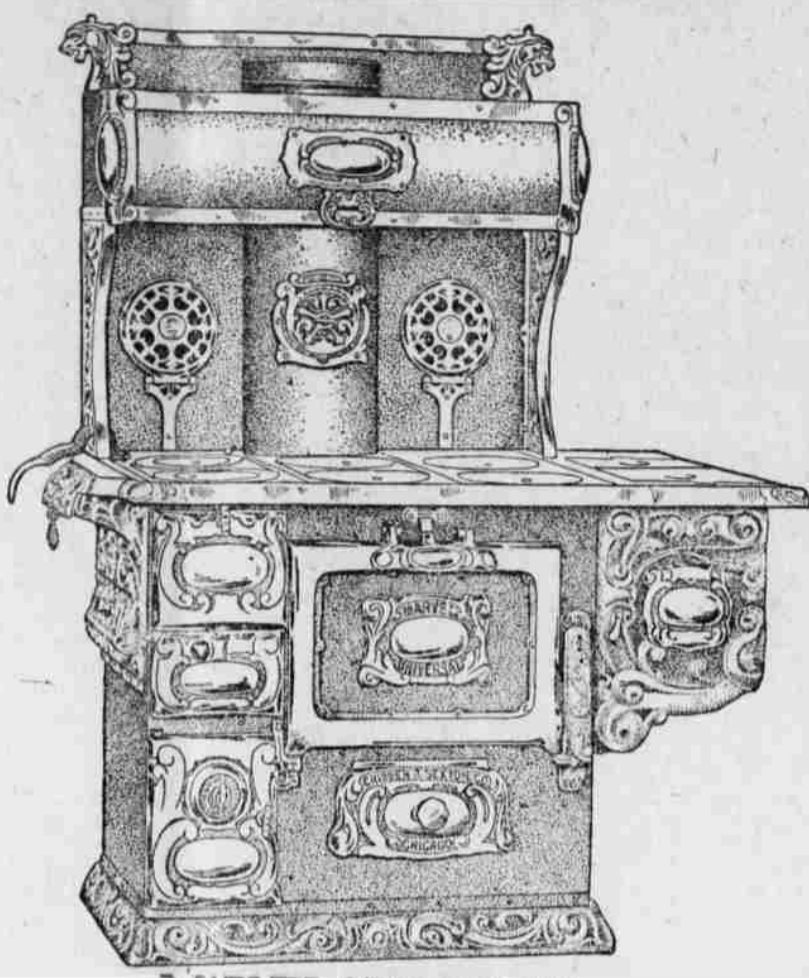
In a language lesson in the Fourth grade we submit two essays on "A Penny," written by two 10-year-old pupils:
