Receive Hook and Ladder Truck Will Buy County Warrants.

At the regular meeting of the Toledo Fire Department, held at the City Hall last Tuesday night, the regular election of officers for the ensuing term occurred. They are,

The report of Treasurer Hayden was read and accepted. The report showed a balance in the Department's treasury of \$94.70.

F. W. Carson reported the completion of the hook and ladder truck, and recommended the addition of a platform, hooks, etc., to same. The addition was ordered. On motion the new Treasurer was instructed to purchase county warrants, not to exceed \$75.

There being several members of the Department entitled to exemption certificates, same were issued. On motion a committee, consisting of Rens Arnold, R. H. Howell and Arthur Nye, was appointed to draft a new constitution and by-laws and submit same to the Department at the next regular meeting.

The Treasurer was ordered to give a bond in the sum of \$200 with two sureties. And don't forget the Fireman's dance February 22.
