Siletz Bay-Portland Boat.

Editor LEADER, thinking it might be of interest to the people of the county as well as those of Siletz and Salmon River bays, I thought that I would write a few lines for your paper. Farmers of this vicinity have been hampered in the past for want of shipping facilities. The bottom lands here are as rich as any in the state. I have raised potatoes that yielded at the rate of eight hundred bushels per acre, and other vegetables in proportion, but no market. We must better ourselves and remedy this unprofitable situation. We have been offered three boats, from which we can choose, to make regular trips in here as freighters. First, a small boat carrying fifteen ton, the party owning it wants a contract with us that we give him all our freight or at least all he can do of it. Second, we form a Stock Company and pay \$4000 for a boat carrying 20 ton. Third, join a Stock Company, the shares consisting of one hundred dollars each. The boat costing (\$18,000) in writing it reads eighteen thousand. Now don't look wall eyed and say you can't! you can't! This boat's dimensions will be 85 feet long and 24 foot wide and when loaded will only draw 7 feet of water. It will be large enough to carry 80,000 feet of lumber. This last boat would be my choice. The man who has drafted the plans and will run it will put in one half the money. He has had much experience as a seaman and never plunged into danger. He is a man of good sound judgement and can tell at a glance when it is safe to cross the bar. This boat will have two 80 horse engines and work will commence at once if the money is raised. Let every farmer consider his interests at stake and do all he can to put this boat running. We expect to hear more in a short time of this enterprise. G. S. PARMELE.
