COMMISSIONERS' COURT IN SESSION

Tax Levy Made, Supervisors Appointed, Much Other Business Done

County Official's Salaries.

Independence, Oregon,

To the Editor:

I have been asked by a number of people to introduce a bill putting all county officers on a flat salary, and thus save the County Court much time in passing on the accounts of the officers not all ready under a flat salary, as it occupies a great deal of the time of the County Court that might be used in more important business in the interests of the county.

Some of the officers claim that their salaries are too low, and in some instances I think this is true. When the county was created we had an assessed valuation of only about one half million dollars, whereas we now have over \$6,000,000. on our tax roll. The county is becoming settled up and naturally all kinds of business is increasing. This is also true in the matter of county business.

Now as a tax payer of Lincoln county, as well as representing the people thereof, I should like to know what the tax payers of the county think of this matter, as they must pay the bills, and I do not know of any better way to ascertain their wishes than to get them through an editorial from your paper, as I have always believed that the local newspapers not only voiced the best interests of the county but also the will of the people. Lincoln county is young and growing, and there are many needed improvements, particularly in the matter of better roads, and the County Court must necessarily look out for the interests of the tax payers. Yet economy does not always consist in guarding the treasury with a miserly hand. One of the most important offices of the county is that of County Assessor. The salary is fixed at \$3. per day for six months. If a proper and uniform assessment is made it requires the services of one man from four to six months in the field to do so. His expenses must necessarily be two thirds of his salary if he pays his bills.

I believe that every county officer should keep his office open from 8 o'clock in the morning until 5 o'clock in the evening, so as to give the taxpayers an opportunity to get information without having to write to an attorney at the county seat or elsewhere and pay a fee for the same.

Another important office in the county is that of School Superintendent. He should not be obliged to teach school or make rails in order to earn a living while he is managing the affairs of our public schools, which are dearer to the common people and have more to do with the settlement and prosperity of the county than any other matter, unless it be a good, honest and equitable assessment.

In order to protect the widows and orphans, and that all estates may be properly administered upon so that the titles to realty may be perfect the County Judge must necessarily be an attorney, and if an attorney is elected county judge he is thereby thrown out of all probate courts. Therefore, the salary of this office should be sufficient to pay for good, competent services rendered.

The County Treasurer should also keep his office open from 8

o'clock in the morning until 5 o'clock in the evening each day in the week excepting Sunday and legal holidays, and should be paid a reasonable compensation for his services.

Desiring to be governed in this matter by the people and the best interests of the county, I shall be pleased to have your opinion through the columns of your paper, as well as that of any taxpayer.
