Charles Dunn started for Tillamook February 22nd, enroute for Astoria. Clarence Parmele accompanied him with a two-horse buggy. They will examine the milking machines, which are said to work to perfection.

Two cruisers for the Oregon Fir Company were sizing up our timber on Siletz bay last week.

About a year ago while H. F. Parmele was working as head sawyer at the Siletz Bay mill, the off-bearer failed to take a wide board away and it falling on the saw shot through striking Mr. Parmele on the chest and stomach knocking him back several feet. He was picked up apparently dead and was insensible for several hours. The effects from which he may never fully recover. He has been attending a college the past winter, and finding his health still failing, he went to the Portland Sanitorium and was examined. The doctors pronounced it ulceration of the stomach, caused by a bruise. He returned home last week and is forbidden to eat or drink anything stronger than water or milk, and to keep as quiet in bed as possible.

The most spirited meeting held by the Pendleton Commercial Association in six months—and they have been actively at work during the past year—outlined plans along even broader and more vigorous lines. W. A. Moore was elected President.
