David Rosebrook, director of the Portland Symphony Orchestra, was this morning chosen director of the city park band for the coming concert season. He will proceed immediately with the organization of the band, which will give concerts during the Summer months in the various parks of the city.

It is the purpose of the Park Board to organize the best band in Garden Seeds in bulk at the the history of the city. Helps Smaller Districts. What the Hawky School | Bill Attorney C. E. Hawkins was at does: It helps the smaller districts, it provides ways so that each district shall have at least \$300. (In many cases, in this county, a portion of this will be taken out of the general fund of the county.) It provides that each district shall have at least six months school each School year. But it does not go into effect this year.

The \$300 will be raised as follows: The county court will levy a school tax sufficient to make 87 for each child in the county between 4 and 20 years. On the first Monday of October, each district will receive \$100 out of the money so raised, and the remainder will be divided according to the number of pupils in the districts.
