We are Out of the Hole.

For the first time since Lincoln county was created just sixteen years and one month ago, it is out of debt. In this issue appears the call of County Treasurer McCluskey calling in all unpaid warrants drawn on the county up to and including date. And Sheriff Ross has more than enough money on hands to pay all other warrants recently issued and not presented to the Treasurer for endorsement.

We are proud of the record of our county. When Lincoln county was created we had no roads, no bridges, no improvements of any kind. The expense of dividing the county, transcribing the records from the old county—Benton—and many other expenses put the county in debt many thousands of dollars. Then when our courts began building roads and bridges, and a thousand and one other things we were in debt something over \$60,000.

Lincoln county is a very difficult county in which to build roads. It is rough, and the many streams require hundreds of bridges. We now have lots of roads, we have a good courthouse with large comfortable rooms for our officials; we have it all paid for and have money left in the treasury.

It has been a hard proposition for our people and county courts and other officials to keep things moving. Our county is sparsely settled, we have had less than most counties to draw revenue from, our taxes have been rather high, but we have lived through it all and now can hope for better things. We will have more taxable property each year. Within a very short time we hope to have thousands of acres of our valuable timber lands—never before taxed—cruised and placed on the tax rolls. Our revenue will be almost doubled when this is done. Thousands of acres of this land has already been placed on the rolls through patents having been issued to homesteaders. Our county officials have done well in managing the affairs of the county during these sixteen years. We are proud of them; and we proud of our county.

The Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition and the Oregon State Commission are making a strenuous effort to secure for Portland Day at the Seattle Fair all the floats that will be shown in the "Spirit of the Golden West" parade at the Rose Festival of June Ninth. This pageant will be one of the most beautiful features of the Carnival, and will serve splendidly to exploit the wonderful resources of the Oregon Country, as each float, car or chariot will represent the matchless fruit and other products indigenous to the many important localities of the great Northwest country. It is proposed to make the parade in Seattle an exact replica of this particular parade as seen in Portland.

A Lincoln County girl after visiting the Lewis and Clark exposition at Portland describes her visit thus: "O I had a perfectly beautiful time! Contrived there a little after noon and took a cabby to the hotel. We went to our rooms in a refrigerator and the rooms were illustrated with laughing gas and heated with legislatures. I was too excited to eat much but I saw everything on expiration and when I got home I felt well prepaid for
