Farming here consists of a few acres in crops of fruit, vegetables, etc., with a herd of dairy cows, some hogs, sheep, goats, etc., running out on the hills. A farmer can make more money off ten acres here than the average man can off a hundred any where in the East. If you don't believe it, just try it.

More towns die for want of confidence on the part of business men and lack of public spirit than any cause says a floating editorial. When a man in search of a home or a business location goes into a town and finds everything brim full of hope and enthusiasm of the prospects of the place and all earnestly at work to build it up he soon becomes imbued with the same spirit, and as a result drives down stakes and goes to work with the same interest.
