To the above named defendant, James Trail: In the name of the State of Oregon: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled Court and suit, now on file with the Clerk of the said Court on or before six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: on or before the 4th day of June, 1909.

And you are notified that if you fail to appear and answer the said complaint as herein required, the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in the said complaint, to-wit, for a decree of said Court dissolving the marriage contract now existing between the plaintiff and the defendant; and further, that plaintiff be restored to her maiden name, to-wit, Susie A. ## THAT BASE BALL GAME.

The First Game of the Season Was Played Sunday.

Most everybody in town was at the ball grounds last Sunday afternoon to witness the big game of ball between a team picked from the Altree mill and logging camps and a bunch of town boys. While it was not the swiftest game ever played here, the spectators enjoyed it greatly. Several of the players had never had a baseball in their hands before, but that didn't seem to bother them much. Ed Altree caught a fly from someone's bat, and it looked for five or ten minutes as though he intended keeping the ball as a souvenir but he was finally induced to give it to one of the other players who threw it to the pitcher. Si Hanson caught a fly, but he wasn't to blame for that, we don't think he intended to. Si also got put out at first by a false motion of Dr. Burgess, the baseman. We didn't think that was fair, as Si didn't know that the ball was still in the Doctor's hands.
