A Letter.

Burrough, Cal., May 25, '09.

For the sake of the good people and enquiring friends of Lincoln county, Oregon, I submit the following: Well we find ourselves in Burrough Valley, 40 miles north-east of Fresno, Fresno county, California. We have found just what we were looking for, a good place for lung trouble. It is said to be the healthiest place in California. Burrough valley is a small valley up in the mountains about 2000 ft. elevation. We are pleasantly located have not yet bought. Wife's health is improving and this mountain air with every day sunshine makes me feel like a man of forty. It is harvest time here now, and the boy and I have struck a good job. I have been mowing wheat the past three days and am only commenced. Wheat, oats and barley are raised here but it is cut for hay. Almost all kinds of fruit are grown. There are three gold mines near by. A few days ago I helped a neighbor load a load of bailed hay and take it over to the feed stables of the Pineridge stage line, a distance of five miles. We got over all right, but when coming back in a sharp turn in the road we met a mule whacker with twelve mules and a trail wagon. We had to unhitch our leaders and pull our wagon back a few rods to let him pass. Have to be very careful in passing teams for if you go over the bank its good by mules. How would you like to be a mule whacker, in the saddle day after day over the dusty roads in the hot sun. It is a fright to see the stage and freight wagons wrapped in a cloud of dust, but this is California. I thought I would see some fine gardens when I got where they irrigated but I am disappointed. I haven't seen a garden anywhere as good as the one I left. Rain for me instead of irrigation. I will say right here if you are well and have no other excuse only the rain, you had better be still. We have lots of good things to eat here, kind neighbors and friends, and we are happy.
