Teachers' Institute at Waldport

The Lincoln County Teachers' Local Institute convened at Waldport June 19. There was a goodly number of teachers and a great many more patrons and children in attendance.

The forenoon session was called to order by Superintendent Goin and the subjects of Music, Song-books and Writing were fully discussed.

At 1:30 p. m. all were ready and the work was opened by a paper, "The Teacher's Relation to the Community," by Miss Ewing, which caused a hearty and lengthy discussion. Prof. Willson gave an interesting talk on the "Advantages of the Union High School," which should interest and arouse every patron in the county. Mr. Keady, a patron of Waldport, handled his subject with great care and caused a great wave of humor to pass over the audience. Mr. Glines' few remarks were spicy and left Miss Ewing in a serious turn of mind over the "to be purchased suit of clothes." The subjects of Supplementary Reading, Government and Teachers' Salaries were made very interesting.

The meeting was adjourned that the teachers could avail themselves of the opportunity to visit the beach and recuperate for the evening session.

In the evening all were in attendance at the exercises given by the 8th and 9th grade graduates. The band furnished excellent music and the choir interspersed with a few very good and appropriate songs. The people were favored by two character sketches by Mr. and Mrs. Evens, which need no comment.

The eighth grade pupils were Halcie Glines, Earnest Lebow, Erwin Hosford and James Goin. Their papers were good and they received showers of flowers. Miss Ona Glines' oration was excellent and it is hoped will not stop this side of Harvard.

The people of Waldport are to be congratulated on their schoolhouse and splendid teachers, and the members of the institute wish them to accept our heartfelt thanks for the good time and entertainment which we received and there is only one regret—that there were so many teachers in the county that were not there to partake of the good feast, both intellectually and socially.
