The Executive Committee of the Fair and Festival held their final meeting last Tuesday evening. At this meeting all committees for the different work were appointed and all final arrangements were made. This committee has worked faithfully during the past several months and now it is up to the people of the county to do their part in making this fair what it should be. The meeting lasted till 11 o'clock. Several enthusiastic citizens were present. The several committees will be published in next week's issue.

The State Fair of Oregon is growing rapidly, keeping pace with the general improvements of our State, and attempting to encourage the development of agriculture in all its branches. Much encouragement has been given to the State Board of Agriculture by the legislature, largely due to the assistance of the press of the state. Funds thus secured have been expended very satisfactorily to the people at large and for such expenditures will be found on the State Fair grounds, many permanent buildings and other substantial improvements that gives this State institution much more prominence and importance.

In another column Hans Olson protests against the action of the committee appointed at the last meeting of the Toledo Development League to draft resolutions to our representatives protesting against the report of the United States engineers condemning the Olalla diking project. Why does Mr. Olson single out the committee for his attack? This committee was simply appointed to express the sentiment of the Development League, which is composed of the public spirited men of Toledo and the surrounding country. By vote these men condemn the action of Mr. Olson in fighting the project. He wants the law upheld. Hasn't the law been upheld? The residents of Olalla have acted in good faith and have complied with the law in their every action. The state laws permitted them to build this dam, the County Court made orders allowing the work. Where are they violating the law? Mr. Olson, by his silence, himself sanctioned the project until by an unavoidable accident the work was partly washed out some months ago. When this dam was washed out the people of Olalla got busy and began rebuilding. Now here comes along the U. S. engineers and report adversely on the work. The people of Olalla and the surrounding community protest against the report and ask that the work remain.


