City Caucus.

The citizens of Toledo met at the City Hall last Monday evening to nominate candidates to be voted on at the coming city election next Monday. The meeting was called to order by E. J. Avery and R. A. Arnold was chosen chairman and F. N. Hayden secretary. The following ticket was placed in the field:

For Councilmen for two years, C. B. Crosno, Lee Wade and F. W. Carson.

For Marshal for one year, Ted McElwain.

Messrs. Crosno and Carson are now holding the offices of councilmen, their present term will expire in January. Mr. McElwain, the newly nominated candidate for marshal, at present holds that office, having been appointed to fill the unexpired term of Charles Bradeson, resigned. Mr. Wade is the only new man on the list.

These men may feel pretty certain of election as there is no other ticket out against them. It is just as well so for there are no better men in the town for the positions than those composing this ticket. On their election the citizens of our city will feel assured of a safe, sane and conservative administration.

Road districts inclined to be backward can greatly retard the building of roads, and other districts inclined to be progressive are discouraged and often prevented from building roads by a bunch of idle land holders in control of the next district through which the main road must pass. A general road levy by the county of 5 or 6 mills, together with an assessment, does not encourage the idle land speculator at the expense of the improver and user any more than the law allows, and the backward district has to have some good roads anyhow.
