Boat Factory at Toledo.

The Modern Improvement Company has leased the property just south and adjoining the city wharf for a period of three years at an annual rental of \$50. This company will build ways here for the purpose of hauling out and painting and repairing vessels, also build a wharf for the loading and unloading of freight and passengers. They are also going to build a shop for the manufacture of rowboats and launches. All told they expect to spend \$1500 for these improvements on this property, which work will begin at once.
