Mr. Nash's Talk to Farmers.

Editor LEADER:—My last letter with the methods of co-operation used in other places for placing in the best market, on the best terms for the producer, the eggs and chickens of a large district, by means of local associations that are combined in one county or district association.

Similar agencies can be, and are at work to deal with the other products of the farm. This system has been developed in France for a good many years to a larger degree than as yet in the U. S. so far as I have read.

But it is plain that the greater the volume of business done by a central association the less the proportion of expense that would fall on each item brought in by any one subscriber.

Each subscriber, therefore, would have the double object, 1st to increase the quantity and the value of the products he brought in, and 2nd to enlist as many as possible of his friends and neighbors in the association.

Even without the spur of membership in such an association as I have sketched very many of our Lincoln County farmers are engaged in the worthy effort of increasing the quantity and the value of their products. All honor to them!

Their efforts are mostly dairying, to judge by the cream cans waiting, filled or empty at every depot along our rail road.

Almost every ranch, near to or far from the rail road that is our way out and in, shows the upturned cans on the bench by the door, and the bright milk pails hung on the fence. The hum of the separator fills the air, night and morning, wherever one goes.

The start has been made by every one so occupied along the upward path and the number grows.

But just now is the time of test and trial. The cows are there, the separator is there, the milk is there but how about the milk supply?

Ask this very question of first one and then another of our friends. One says "The hay is heading out pretty well and I feed my cows all they will eat but they don't give as much milk as I expected. Another answers "Well I sowed three or four acres of vetches and that hay is a great help." A third one says "I had a good patch of carrots and rutabagas, and now the cows look for their feed and eat all up clean."

A fourth replies "I heard so much about kale for cow feed in the winter that I thought I would try a patch, and it helps fine!"

So you see, it is nearly always a patch here, and a piece there which begins and ends the story. Every man of us has to try out each experiment for himself, and hardly one, so far as I know, sets down in the early spring and figures it out in tonnage—tonnage, mind you—not patches, how much so many cows must have for so many months of each and all the cows feeds needed to keep up this milk supply which is now the all necessary problem.

Can't we, or don't we believe what agricultural papers and their many correspondents, and all the College people and the Secretary of Agriculture and his bulletins, have been telling us and keep on telling us every week now for years past about this?

If Lincoln County farmers could not be relied on to give us these crops there would be no sense in my writing this. But we know that it rests on us, on each one in his place, to do the needful work, and do it in time, and keep on doing it, and then the kale, and vetch, and the oats, will be on hand for the dairy cows when they are wanted, and enough of them. There seems to be common consent among all the authorities that it takes daily vetch hay 18 pounds, roots or kale, 40

pounds, and 4 to 6 pounds of rolled or crushed oats to feed one good dairy cow and, keep up her flow of milk in these winter months. Various alternating feeds are named but the above, Lincoln County farms will give us, excellent in both quantity and quality.

But—and it is a big "but" I know very well—to do it takes first a good look ahead, and then a long pull and a strong pull, but the end is worth it, is it not?

And this move up in both quantity and value of our farm product requires no making and joining in associations, nor any great out lay in money, but it does need good sense to lay out the plans, and hard work and perseverance to carry them out.

Possibly this letter is not strictly in line with my purpose—but it seemed to me it wanted writing.

It may be that I am just ignorant of what my neighbors are doing. It may be that for dairies of 10 cows 180 lbs. of vetch hay, 400 pounds of kale or carrots and rutabagas, or mangoes and 40 pounds, of crushed oats are being feed each day. If so I beg such a dairymen's pardon and congratulate him. Wallis Nash.

Dairy Interests.

I would like to speak a word to those who intend to furnish milk to a cheese factory. In order to build a factory and furnish it with the right sized vats, some knowledge of the amount of milk that will be furnished must be had. A postal card stating the number of cows each one intends to milk, sent to G. S. Parmele will be sufficient. The factory will be built as small as the patronage will permit and after the building is up and machinery bought will be to late to add more patrons. One important feature in the dairy business is to take good care of your cows through February and March. Get them up and feed them well and groom them. One fat cow is worth more than two poor ones for profit. Now is the time to prepare sheds to milk in, the cows will do enough better to pay the extra expense. If you need lumber from the Parmele mill it should be ordered before the rise comes in price the 15th of March. We have as rich dairy land as can be found in any country and if other men can start with nothing, and in a few years have a large bank account, we, with our rich land can bank the dollars surprisingly fast. When \$12,000 can be paid for a 40 acre dairy farm in Tillamook it will discount the timber land one hundred to one.
