Sealed bids will be received by the County Court of Lincoln County, for "Hendrickson Dike" near Bay View, under following specifications.

Beginning at a point 100 feet west of what is known as Hendrickson's Boat Landing at foot of hill on county road, thence in a north easterly direction following county road across dike flat to foot of hill, a distance of 432 feet.

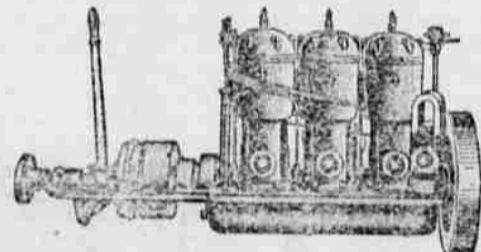
