The game will then be called, County Judge Charles H. Gardner will pitch the first ball and Mayor C. E. Hawkins will catch it, or at it, and Sheriff J. H. Ross will act as umpire. After these preliminary ceremonies are over the game will be commenced in real earnest, by the knocking of a three base hit by George Schenck, other thrilling events will follow each other in rapid succession for about four hours when a recess will be called to allow for refreshments, after which the game will be finished and every one will go home happy in the thought of a day well spent. The proceeds from this game will go toward fixing up the ball grounds. The married men have the following recruits at present: G. R. Schenck, Burgess, Hayden, R. With hold crammed to capacity and freight piled on deck until some of it reached to the top of the pilot-house the gasoline schooner Wilhelm, Captain Tyler, left down last evening bound for Yaquina Bay, Alsea and the Siuslaw. Those who saw her leaving say she had aboard the greatest variety of goods ever taken out of here by a small ocean-carrier. The cargo measured more than 150 tons. It was made up of agricultural implements, building material, black powder, dynamite, strawberry plants, beer, furniture and household goods of every description, fruit of all sorts, tiling, oil drums, bricks, cement, paint, hardware, groceries and general merchandise. There is scarcely anything shipped out of here that she did not carry. The Wilhelm was but recently placed on the run between Portland and Yaquina, Alsea and Siuslaw, bringing farm produce on the up trips. She is supposed to provide a ten days service. After leaving the Columbia River the boat has to cross in and out over three bars.—Portland Telegram, April 20th.

Sheriff Ross has just completed plans for the construction of a large building on the corner of Hill and Fourth streets, where the little plumbing shop now stands. The building will be 48x75 feet, one story and will front on Hill street. Ten feet will be cut off the front for offices and entrance, and two ware rooms will be built under the building at the rear end. The main room of the building which will be 48x65 feet, will be constructed for a moving picture show and probably will be used as a skating rink. The contract for the construction of the building has been let and work will be commenced by the first of the month.
