Fair Committees

Hold Session.

Lay Plans for Permanent Buildings and Make Arrangements for a Larger and Better Fair.

A meeting of the committees of the county who are arranging for the Lincoln County fair which is to be held here at Toledo, September 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th, was held at the city hall Tuesday evening. The committeemen present were O. Middlekauff, of Yaquina; Carl Davis Siletz; O. G. Dalaba, Elk City; A. L. McDonald, Chitwood; B. F. Grant, Harlan; Wallis Nash, Nashville; E. J. Avery, C. B. Crono, J. F. Stewart, C. G. North and R. E. Collins, Toledo. L. M. Commons of Ona was here during the day but was unable to remain for the evening session. The committeemen from the different localities are each entitled to appoint some lady in his district to aid in soliciting exhibits for the ladies department at the Fair. The following is the list of ladies and the district which they represent as appointed to date: Mesdames C. G. Copeland, Siletz; C. C. McBride, Eddyville; L. Norton, Nashville; John Lloyd, Kernville; J. Harrison, Waldport; P. A. Miller, Chitwood; J. H. Van Orden, Elk City; Alice Waugh, Toledo; John Margson, Winant; B. O. Young, Harlan; Miss Hester Hill, Ona.

The committee on grounds and buildings reported that they had made arrangements with A. T. Peterson to lease a five acre tract, from him, for a term of five years, to be used as a fair ground. This land is adjoining the fair grounds of last year, on the west. The committee was instructed to close the deal for this tract. Next the matter of buildings was taken up and after some discussion a permanent building was decided upon which will be erected at once so as to be ready for the Fair this year. The building decided upon is to be 40 by 100 feet.

The services of the Waldport Band will try and be secured to furnish music again during Fair week.

One day of the Fair will be Benton County Day, another will be Elk and Linn County Day and the last day will be Lincoln County and Pioneer Day.

Call for County Convention.
