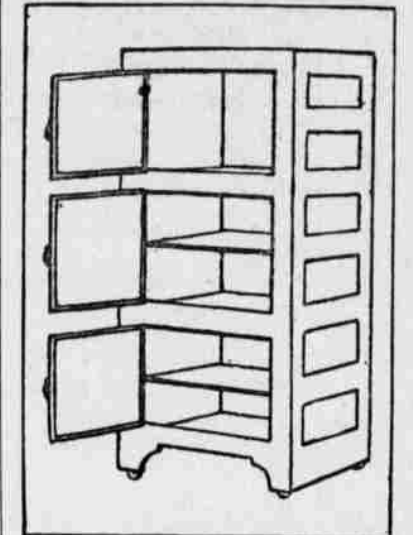

Refrigerator That is Constructed Along the Lines of the Porcelain Bathtub.

An unclean refrigerator can never be a good refrigerator, and the proper care of this very necessary article is always more or less a care to the housekeeper. Great advances have been made in the construction of refrigerators mainly by the elimination



of all cracks and crevices which might offer a lodging place for particles of food. The perfection of this scheme seems to be in the manufacture of the interior lining of the refrigerator in one piece, being pressed out of the sheet metal and enameled in the same manner as the porcelain bathtubs. This leaves all the interior surfaces entirely smooth so that every part may be reached with the cleaning cloth or brush. Another advantage claimed is the positive immunity from leakage.

Spinach Salad.
Wash a peck of spinach carefully in boiling water until every particle of sand is removed, boil immediately. When the spinach is done, strain and chop finely and pack into six or more quart glasses. Arrange the same number of slices of cold tongue on a dish with a garnish of lettuce leaves and hard-boiled eggs, and when the spinach is well chilled turn out the contents of each glass upon the meat. Serve with French dressing.

Braiding Hint.
Now that braiding is so much in use this advice may be found helpful. Instead of stamping the design on material trace the designs on tissue paper. Then sew the paper on the goods to be braided, and sew the braid on the paper. The paper can easily be torn from the braid, and if it is ever removed the stamping will not be on the goods.

A Homemade Moss Rug.
Take a piece of striped bed ticking the length desired for rug. Now take old homemade woolen socks or stockings and cut them down lengthwise, about 1 1/2 inches wide. Sew one edge of your strip to the stripes of the ticking and ravel the other edge. To be made to best resemble moss color your socks and stockings.

Tongue on Toast.
One cup cold boiled tongue, yolk of two eggs, one-quarter teaspoonful of mustard, dash of cayenne; chop the tongue very fine, beat the yolks until light, add them to the tongue, add the seasoning, stir the whole over the fire until the eggs are cooked; serve immediately on squares of toast.

Date Jam.
Remove the stones from two pounds of nicely washed dates. Put them in a saucepan, with one pound of sugar, one pint of water, one teaspoonful of butter, the grated rind of one lemon and a dash of nutmeg. Simmer until thick, stirring frequently, pouring into glasses and finish as for fruit jellies.

Veal Cheese.
This makes a very tasty meat dish and is a change from the ordinary.
Prepare equal quantities of sliced veal and cold tongue (smoked). Run each kind of meat separately through meat chopper and proceed to pack in a dish or cake pan, mixing in alternate layers, first the smoked tongue and then the veal. Moisten with melted butter. Press down hard. Keep it well covered in a dry place. Slice when cold.

Baked Corn.
Take off the coarse outer husks from young corn, turn back the inner and remove the silk. Bring the inner husks back over the end, tie in place and lay in the oven. Bake about 20 minutes.

Breaded Veal.
Dip the veal chops in egg, then roll in bread crumbs and fry. Then lay them on a plate and put in the steamer and steam for an hour and a half. Serve hot and they are perfectly delicious.

KEEP THE CLOSETS CLEAN

Point of Importance That is Too Frequently Overlooked by the Busy Housewife.

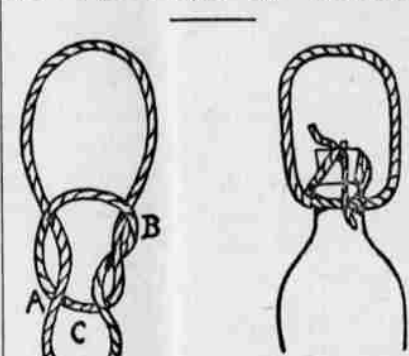
Usually there are about the house closets so dark that except at the yearly or semi-yearly housecleaning it is impossible to tell whether or not they are dirty. They are breeders of disease, even in the best-managed households, for no maid and few mistresses will crawl into the dark hole under the stairs or back in the kitchen after perfectly invisible dust.

One solution of the problem is to paint these closets white, ceiling, floor and walls. It is easy enough to see dirt then, and the other and more useful contents of the closet as well. If one can keep the hall closet clean and find the family overshoe on sight, simply by painting the closet white, then by all means let us hasten to the paint shop and remove the obsolete and horrible wall paper that usually incubates these germ hotels.

If the closet is still dark after this treatment try cleaning with the aid of the electric flash light. There is no danger of fire and corners can be closely investigated. All of which is an advantage to the housewife who does not love dirt and disorder.

But always, when cleaning day comes, consider first the closets and, most important of all of these is the sloping, dark, neglected closet under the stairs.

TO TIE CORK IN BOTTLE



First make a loop in a piece of strong twine and pass both ends through at B and A. Place the loop over the neck of the bottle and draw it snugly at A and tie in a hard knot at B, when there will be a string on both sides of the bottle to tie firmly over the cork, also a handy loop to handle the bottle with.

Frozen Tomatoes.
Cut into dice enough tomatoes to make a quart, add a chopped onion, salt and pepper, a dash of paprika, a pinch of sugar, a little grated nutmeg and a little grated lemon peel. When the juice has been extracted from the pulp strain twice, the second time through a fine strainer, and freeze until firm, either in a mold or in the usual freezer. Serve on a bed of lettuce leaves with mayonnaise dressing.

To Clean a Black Skirt.

To clean a black skirt, lay the skirt as flat as possible on a clean table. Remove all grease spots with brown paper and a hot iron, then with a sponge dipped in strong coffee rub over the whole of the dress, paying special attention to the front and edge of the skirt. When the whole of the skirt has been sponged and is still damp, iron on the wrong side unperfectly dry.

When Canning Peaches.

When canning peaches, save part of the stones and extract the kernels. Into a saucepan put one large cupful of sugar and two-thirds of a cupful of water. When the syrup boils, drop in the peach kernels, of which there should be one cupful. Let them boil gently for ten minutes and then seal up. They make a delicious addition to fruit-alad, for they give it a real peach flavor.

Delicious Breakfast Muffins.

One-third teaspoon salt and one-half teaspoonful of soda dissolve in one-half cup of hot water, one tablespoon of molasses, one tablespoon of melted butter, one well beaten egg, one cup of milk, one cup of bran meal and one and one-half cups of graham meal. Bake in gem pans 25 minutes. This will make nine.

Ant Remedy.

Here is a sure remedy for the removal of the little ant pest: Remove paper from shelves, then wash them with hot water. Prepare some strong alum water and take a small paint brush and cover the shelves, cracks and corners a few times, and you will soon be free from them.

Use Paraffin Twice.

Paraffin can be used the second time to cover jelly and jam if it is washed clean and boiled before being turned over the fruit again.
