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In last week's issue of the LEADER there was published a financial report, showing the liabilities, resources, etc., of the Lincoln County Fair Association. The report shows that the Fair is a money making proposition and will soon be out of debt. Next year it is the intention of the fair management to give several hundreds of dollars as cash prizes instead of just giving ribbons as heretofore. These prizes, while probably not large, will go a long way toward paying the exhibitor for his trouble and expense in getting his exhibit ready for placing on exhibition at the fair. As we understand it, it is not the intention to do away with the ribbons entirely, but to give a cash and ribbon prize both. After the association is out of debt, the policy of the management will be to spend all surplus money that may be taken in, above the actual expense of conducting the fair and awarding prizes, for the enlarging of the scope of the fair, such as building a race track, more exhibit buildings, and for improving the grounds. The Lincoln County Fair is a permanent institution and every one should do all in their power to make it larger and better each year.

The Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company and Southern Pacific Company, lines in Oregon, have just issued a neat little 14 page booklet with a cover entitled Success in Oregon and Washington. The book is profusely illustrated with scenes of Oregon and Washington. The book is filled with interesting short articles on the successes that are being made, on small tracts of land, by enterprising people of the two states. Each sketch is written by some actual resident of either Oregon or Washington, and gives the writer's own experiences, as to how they are making successes of different pursuits such as, orcharding, raising small fruits, gardening, dairying, poultry keeping, etc. Anyone wishing one of these booklets can procure same free by writing to Wm. The Toledo Port Commission has closed a deal whereby they sell \$50,000 worth of Port bonds. The money received from the sale of these bonds will be used for the improvement of the bay. The bonds were advertised for sale, for just a short time, but during this time eleven inquiries were received, and the bonds, when sold, were sold at a premium of \$550. S. Kean & Company, bankers, of Chicago, being purchasers. The Port Commission will now proceed to carry out the work as outlined by the engineer whom they employed last fall to make a survey of the bay. Some eleven jetties will be built and several bars excavated. It is contemplated at present to build a suction dredge for the removing of these bars. The work when completed will mean a sixteen foot ship channel from Toledo to the sea.

McMinnville will plant roads leading to the city with walnut trees for a distance of at least a mile from town, making that place truly the walnut center of Oregon.

Benefits following the Oregon Development League convention last week at Salem will be state wide.
