She was the mother of eight children, six of whom survive her, four boys and two girls. They are, Thomas, Johnny, Rudy of this Bay, and Calvin of Summit, Benton county; Mrs. T. A. She was born in McMinn county, Tennessee. In August, 1846, she was united in marriage to Henry P. Butler, who departed this life in 1892. From Tennessee they moved to Arkansas where they resided one year, moving thence to Missouri where they resided three or four years. From there they went to Illinois where they remained until 1864. They came to Oregon then, settling in Grande Ronde valley. The following year they moved to Benton county and in January of the same winter came to this Bay.
