Telephone Company Formed.
What is to be known as the Siletz
Bay Mutual Telephone Company
has been formed, with headquarters
at Taft. T. M. McClintock is pres-
ident of this organization and W.
M. Dodson secretary. The com-
pany will commence building op-
erations immediately and will put a
line through from Taft to Newport,
a distance of 25 or 30 miles.
Branch lines will be built up the
Siletz River and Schooner Creek.
The line up the Siletz will extend
for a distance of twelve miles for the
present but may be pushed through
to the Agency. The line up Schoon-
er Creek will be six miles in length.
Another line will be built from Taft
to Rose Lodge. This section while
one of the most prosperous in the
county has heretofore been without
telephone connection with the other
parts of the state, and the people of
that section have decided to build
their own line and not wait any longer
for some other company to build
