Here's to a Bigger Toledo.

Last Tuesday evening William Bittle Wells, representing the Southern Pacific railroad's advertising department, met with the citizens of Toledo and made them the following advertising proposition: For the consideration of \$1200 they would send a photographer, an artist and a writer, to take photographs of scenes in and around Toledo, to make maps of Toledo and vicinity, to get data and prepare manuscripts for the literature mentioned below; to make engravings for the literature, etc.; to publish and deliver to our railroad agent, literature as follows: A "community" booklet, size 6 by 9 inches, containing 32 pages and a cover, the cover to be printed in three colors and gold, and the number to be furnished of this booklet is ten thousand. A "conductor" booklet, size 4 by 8 inches, number, fifteen thousand, this book has sixteen pages including the cover. A "postal" folder, size three and one half by five and one half inches, number, ten thousand, containing six pages and a cover. Fifteen thousand "colonist" folders, for each of the three seasons, providing colonist rates are in effect.

In addition to all of the foregoing literature they will give us a half page ad in the Sunset Magazine for twelve monthly issues, said ad to be changed each month if desired. They will also give Toledo a two page, illustrated, write-up, to be published in the Sunset Magazine sometime during the ensuing year. They will give our community representation in the lecture bureau of the Harriman lines. They will make an exhibition of our products, in the East, as occasion may warrant, during the year following the signing of their contract. To publish articles about Toledo in their magazine, Abroad, which is published in Europe. And to furnish us with the complete service of the Sunset Homeseekers Bureau for one year from date of contract. In addition to the above they will distribute this literature, free of charge, upon us furnishing them the names of people to whom we wish it sent.

While this may seem like a big undertaking, at first glance, it is not so big, and it is a chance of a life time. It will put Toledo on the map for keeps, and will make us known throughout the East just the same as Medford, Roseburg, Eugene, Albany, Salem, Hood River and lots of other towns are being made known. This advertising taken in connection with the building of our new water system, new school building and the dredging of the harbor, should put Toledo in the front ranks of the live towns of Oregon. The population of Toledo should double during the coming year and with the increase in population, there will be a corresponding increase in the value of property, so a few dollars spent in advertising our resources will return many times in the increased value of property, and besides we have the gratification of living in a live community.

We are being offered some four or five thousand dollars worth of advertising for twelve hundred dollars, said twelve hundred dollars to be paid in installments of one hundred
