The following Board of Directors was elected: Messrs. Walter S. Hall, F. B. Church, Ralph Hamar, A. C. Crawford and C. S. Davis. The directors elected Walter Hall, president; F. B. Church, vice president, and C. S. Davis, secretary and treasurer. Eighty-four percent of the capital stock was subscribed. It is the intention to erect a complete modern plant and employ the best cheese maker procurable; it being the aim of the company to turn out the best grade of cheese on the market, a product that will redound to the credit of Lincoln County.

We sincerely hope that the Fair meeting was a success, and you can rest assured that we will lend our best efforts toward a successful issue of same.
