This is a new high mark for mohair in pools, the Hillsboro pool of 6000 pounds bringing 37.75.

Lincoln county raises as good a grade of mohair as any place in the United States, it having a fine lustre and being entirely free from burrs, sand and other foreign matter. There is room for a great many more goats in Lincoln county and they would help the ranges for cattle. All of the country south of here (Toledo) would make excellent range.

Mr. Pruner does not expect mohair to ever get below 30 cents again for Lincoln county hair.
