Judge Hollis is seeking the nomination for Senator from this, the 24th district, comprising the counties of Lincoln, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill, on the Republican ticket.

Judge Hollis is an attorney and enterprising citizen of Forest Grove. For the past several years he has been secretary of the Bank and Merchants Mutual Fire Relief Association of that city, and has served for several terms as Councilman. He was Representative for Washington county at the last session of the State Legislature. Mr. Hollis promises if elected to support the choice of the people for United States Senator, favor economy in all public matters and all appropriations on a business basis, and such legislation as will be for the best interests of the whole people.
