STATE TO CARRY TIDE-LAND CASE UP.

Governor West in his address at Newport yesterday, spoke at some length on the Lincoln county tide-land case, as recently decided in the State Supreme Court. The Governor said that as the matter now stands the railroad company has Lincoln county completely bottled up. But, in his opinion, the Legislature had no right to make any such grant of the tide-lands to the railroad. He spoke of a similar case occurring in the state of Illinois and when it was carried up to the United States Supreme Court the state won out. He intends that the state of Oregon shall carry this case up to the United States Supreme Court in the near future, and he wants the people of Lincoln county to stand back of him.

Immediately at the close of his speech a resolution was introduced and read by Mr. Blanchard endorsing the action taken by the State Land Board. Someone in the crowd moved the adoption of the resolution and upon the same being put to a vote was carried unanimously.
