MILL TO RESUME OPERATIONS.

Messrs. Montgomery, Huffman and Hobart, members of the Oregon Lumber & Construction Company, were in the city the first of the week looking after their property interests here.

They are considering a deal whereby Messrs. Hoffman and Hobart will lease the mill and run it independently of the company. If this deal materializes, and there is a reasonable certainty that it will, these gentlemen will move to Toledo with their families and personally supervise the running of the mill which will be started at once.

Mr. Hobart is an experienced mill man having been identified with mills on Tillamook bay for the past several years. E. W. Huffman is secretary of the present company and in all probability would continue to look after that end of the business. Under the proposed arrangements Mr. Montgomery will furnish the mill with logs and will look after that end of the business exclusively.

SILETZ WILL BE BRIDGED.

The Commissioners' Court in session here this week let the contract for the construction of a steel bridge across Siletz river, a half mile below the Agency. The contract was awarded to R. E. Meith of Portland, the price being \$9,511. Of this sum the Siletz road district pays \$1,500, the citizens of Siletz donate \$1,000 and the county pays the balance. The bridge will be about 34 feet above low water mark; a steel span 180 feet long will span the stream; the approach on the Siletz side will be 180 feet long and the south approach will be 80 feet long, the bridge will be 16 feet wide, the structure to rest on concrete piers. The bridge must be finished this Fall.
