MILL TO BEGIN SAWING.

E. W. Huffman of the Oregon Lumber & Construction Company was down from Portland again this week making arrangements for the starting of the mill. He with Mr. Hobart have leased the mill and are now negotiating the purchase of the Day timber north of town, through which they already have their logging road built. If they get this timber the mill will be running inside of a week. Otherwise they will have to extend their logging road on up to their own timber which will take about a month's time.

The new firm expects to ship lumber by boat as well as rail and have made arrangements with the Port Commission for the deepening of the channel so they can get vessels up to the mill dock.
