RATES FOR FAIR.

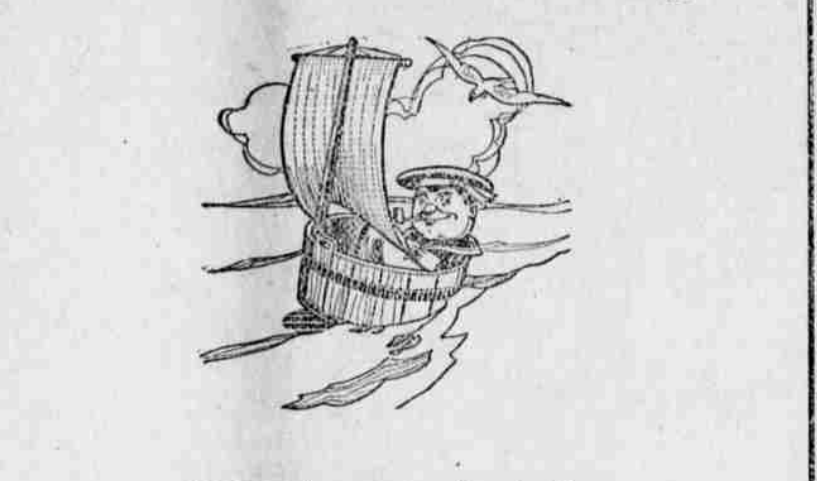
