A deep gloom spread over Yaquina Saturday evening when it was reported that the fishing sloop "Pilgrim" had capsized on the bar and all hands were drowned. After a few hours of breathless anxiety the report was confirmed. During this time the boat had washed on the shore near South Beach and the life savers had gone on board but were afraid to enter the cabin as the water was deep. Later a thorough search was made by M. M. Hackley and C. E. Vanderpool and the bodies of Tarld Tellefson John D. McKenzie and Michael Henry were found. A further search failed to reveal the bodies of Claude Toner and Forrest Wooster and it is supposed that they were washed into the sea when the boat capsized. Plans were made when the boat left Yaquina Saturday morning to remain out until Sunday evening and provisions were taken to supply the needs of the crew for that time. Why an attempt was made to return before Sunday evening is not known. The bar was very rough at the time of crossing and it is thought that the boys did not understand the great risk they were taking in trying to return to port. The bodies that were found were taken to Newport to await the arrival of relatives and friends. The "Pilgrim" is a new boat, recently brought here from Toledo and this was the third trip she had made over the bar. The beach from Heeceta Head to Newport is being constantly patrolled in hopes of recovering the bodies of Claude Toner and Forrest Wooster. The funeral of Tarld Tellefson was held at Newport at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning from the Copeland undertaking parlors. People from all parts of the country attended, as the deceased was well known and had many warm friends. Deepest regrets were expressed at his untimely death. The floral offerings were profuse. A. J. Casteel, Ira Branch, T. Thompson, George Wright, Enoch Olson and G. Hassman acted as pall-bearers.
