SUMMONS.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, in and for the County of Lincoln.

To Niven Hegeman, the above named defendant:

In the name of the State of Oregon, You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit on or before the 13th day of December, 1912, the time prescribed in the order of said court for the publication of this summons. The date of first publication is Friday, the 25th day of October, 1912, and the last publication shall be the 13th day of December, 1912. Said order prescribed that said summons shall be published at least once a week for six consecutive weeks and designated the Lincoln County Leader as the paper in which said summons shall be published. And you are hereby required to so appear and answer said complaint on or before said 13th day of December, 1912.
