**Uncle Sam  
Says Stop It**

If you should receive a notice from us that your subscription is in arrears and that unless you come through at once your paper will be stopped, don't get sore at us, but cough up like a good sport. Don't let your paper be stopped, for then you will have to borrow your neighbor's to read, and he will tell his wife, "Neighbor Jones didn't pay his subscription to the Leader so they had to stop it," and she will tell it to the neighborhood. We do not stop it because we are afraid to trust you but because Uncle Sam says we must, or else pay a fine of from \$100 to \$500. Now we like to send you the Leader, but we do not care to do so quite this badly and are going to obey Uncle Sam like a little man and not run any chances. We are willing to send it for one year then if you don't do your part we must stop it.

Following are some extracts from a notice which we received from the postoffice department this week: "Any person who shall submit or cause to be submitted to any postmaster or to the Postoffice Department or any officer of the postal service any false evidence relative to any publication, for the purpose of securing the admission thereof at the second class rate of transportation in the mails, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and for every such offense, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred nor more than five hundred dollars."

"The right of publishers to extend in good faith credit on subscriptions is recognized and will not be abridged, and although all subscriptions are regarded as expiring with the period for which they were obtained, nevertheless, in order to give an opportunity to secure renewals, copies of their publications will be accepted for mailing as to subscribers at the usual second-class rates of postage for the period of one year from the date of expiration; but copies sent to persons after one year from the date of the expiration of their subscriptions, unless such subscriptions be expressly renewed for a definite time, together with an actual payment of subscription or a bona fide promise of payment, will not be accepted at the pound rate, but will be accepted at the transient second-class rate of one cent for each four ounces or fraction thereof, prepaid by stamps affixed."
