Dr. Joseph K. Dixon of Philadelphia, representing Hon. Rodman Wainmaker, will visit Siletz some time in 1913. He will be accompanied by Inspector McLaughlin, who will be remembered as having prepared a roll of Siletz Indians in 1891. An opportunity will be given Indians to participate in ceremonies similar to those held in New York harbor February 22 of this year, on account of a national monument to be erected in Fort Wadsworth, same having been projected by Mr. Wainmaker and approved by Congress and the President. The same flag used on the above occasion will be used here. Many of the tribes will participate in the same way. It is important that as many of the Indians as possible should be encouraged to be present. As each tribe has a distinctive costume, and as a record will be preserved of the meeting through photographs of the Indians who assemble, which will be placed within the galleries of the national memorial, it is highly desirable for historical purposes that Indians who may care to do so should appear dressed in their native regalia, as did the representatives of the eleven tribes who raised the flag on the site of the monument in New York harbor. Messages will be delivered to the Indians through the phonograph from the President and from the Secretary of the Interior. The site of the ceremony will be at the Agency or school. As the exact date will only be known a few days in advance preparations must not be too long delayed.

Messrs. S. G. Irvin, R. A. Bensell and M. Wygant of Newport had business in the city Wednesday.

A. T. Peterson and son, Will, departed Monday morning for Mossy Rock, Washington, where they will load several cars of chittim bark. Fruit districts of the state might take a tip from Hood River bee keepers, who have asked that orchardists do not spray their trees during the time the blossoms are fully open. This results in killing large numbers of bees, which are the most valuable helpers the orchardists have. Their aid is invaluable in spreading pollen from tree to tree.

By request of Mr. Bethers, we print a copy of a letter he received in answer to a question he had asked the Attorney General:

"Mr. George Bethers, Toledo, Or.. Dear Sir:—Answering your favor of the 25th instant, I beg to say that the Corrupt Practices Act applies to public officers and candidates for public office from the time they become candidates for nomination and until their term of office expires if they are elected.

Mr. Bethers wrote for an explanation of the Act, and asked if the Corrupt Practices Act covered the time from the beginning of the primary till after election or does it cover the whole time from the primary till the elected goes out of office. This question had been asked many times so he took it upon himself to have it answered. He needed the answer to go along with other questions, such as the recall, majority veto, impeachment, etc., required to be known by the Eighth Grade pupils. Mr. Bethers says he used no such language as was printed in the Oregon Journal. In justice to the county officials he thinks it right that the public should know for what time they are under the Corrupt Practices Act.
