About four years ago he came to Toledo and built the Toledo Launch Works, which he operated until he was confined to the house, many of our finest launches that glide up and down the Yaquina Bay were slid from the Toledo Launch Works.

Dave, as he was generally called, was a man of kind and quiet disposition, never doing anyone harm, but always trying to do someone good. No one ever went to him in time of trouble but what he always showed a helping hand, no matter what it cost him.

No mother could have shown a more loving care than did Mrs. Harrison, who watched over his bedside night and day, doing everything that loving hands could do to relieve his suffering. No expense was too great, everything known to medical science was done to restore him back to health, but it proved of no avail.

The funeral was held from the family residence on June 3d and the interment took place in the Toledo cemetery, where beneath the

weeping pines overlooking the Bay, he loved so well, he was laid to rest beneath quantities of beautiful floral offerings placed there by his many friends as a tribute to his noble life. We will all miss him for there will always be a vacant chair. A Friend.
