Fire Destroys Old Courthouse

Saturday morning the livery barn belonging to Gust Olson at the corner of Hill and Fifth streets burned to the ground with all its contents, with the exception of the horses which were gotten out.

The fire was discovered at about half past four by both A. L. Jacobson, who lives near the barn, and Grant Hart, the watchman at the sawmill. Mr. Jacobson at once rushed over and liberated the horses and drove them out, while Mr. Hart gave the alarm, by blowing the mill whistle, and also made preparations to protect the lumber piles and the mill from the fire.

Members of the fire department responded at once to the alarm, but the building was aflame from end to end, it being only thirty minutes from the time the fire was discovered until the walls fell in, so they directed their efforts to saving adjoining buildings.

The efficiency of the fire department and Toledo's new water system was superbly demonstrated as the adjoining buildings are very close and were afire again and again, but through the untiring efforts of the fire fighters the loss was confined to the one building and its contents.

This building was built about twenty-five years ago to be used as town hall. It was afterwards used for a number of years as the Lincoln county Courthouse, but for the last six or eight years has been used as a warehouse and the basement was converted into a livery barn.

The loss to Gust Olson on building and contents amounted to about \$2000. Gardner & Peterson, on hardware stored in the building, \$400; A. T. Peterson, chittim bark stored in the building, \$800; Austin Rosebrook, all his household effects which were stored in the building during their absence in California; E. J. Avery, chest of steam-fitter's tools; M. N. Anderson, counters and store fixtures.

Mr. Olson will rebuild at once.
