The Ollie S. and Fish are engaged in taking people out over the bar on fishing excursions. This is great sport for the tourists who come here for health and pleasure. At times the boat goes out eighteen or twenty miles where the fishing is good. Often one person will catch five or six fine lin or rock cod and frequently catch fine, large halibuts. The people frequently get seasick, but they don't mind that as the fun of fishing and riding on the waves offset any trouble they may have in this line. This fishing business is one of the attractions that is growing in favor all the time. Some five or six of the smaller gasoline launches are engaged in the deep sea fishing right along. Now that we have cold storage it is easy to keep the fish, and all fish that cannot be sold

in the Newport market can be shipped to Portland where there is a ready sale for all the fish and crabs shipped from this place.

The Ahwapeda and Mirene came in with full cargos of freight for Newport. Siletz bay, Toledo and Waldport. This shipping industry is growing better every day and it saves a good many dollars to the consumers in the way of freights.

Mrs. M. W. Simpson and daughter, Frances, of Elk City went out on the Nenamosha to the mouth of Siletz, where they will spend a week or two camping out with friends. This will be an enjoyable trip in this wild, romantic section of Lincoln county, where the rivers abound with fish and the mountains with the larger game, such as bear, cougar, wild cat and deer. ### Rev. Gwynn Makes Correction

Mr. Editor:—To correct a mistake in the columns of the Sentinel in regard to the late marriage law of Oregon. For the benefit of retired ministers of the Presbyterian or M. E. church or any church which is organized and carrying on its work within the state and has congregations in the state of Oregon who is licensed or otherwise authorized by such church to solemnize marriages and who has filed for record his ordination papers with the county clerk of the county within which he resides or in which the marriage is solemnized, evidence satisfactory to the county clerk that he has been ordained or licensed and authorized; and in case of a non-resident minister such filing shall be in any county in which he performs any marriage ceremony. And any minister or priest shall not be required to file such evidence of authority in more than one county.

Therefore it is plain that a minister of an organized church, either Presbyterian or Methodist, etc., active or retired, may solemnize marriages upon properly registering his credentials or ordination papers. Yours respectfully,
