Mr. Editor:-To correct a mistake in the columns of the Sentine 1 in regard to the late marriage law of Oregon. For the benefit of which is organized and carrying on its work within the state and has gon who is licensed or otherwise authorized by such church to solemnize marriages and who has made several notable improvements filed for record his ordination papers with the county clerk of the county within which he resides or in which the marriage is solemnized, evidence satisfactory to the county Arthur Ramsdal returned home clerk that he has been ordained or licensed and authorized; and in case of a non-resident minister such filing shall be in any county in which he performs any marriage ceremony. And any minister or pricst shall not be required to file such evidence of authority in more than one county.
