It is estimated that the grand total for the state this year will be \$245,973,000, or more than \$20,000,000, in excess of the returns of last year. The estimate of the items is as follows: Livestock, \$107,914,000; grain, \$386,145,000; vegetables, \$22,135,000; fruit, \$8,143,000; miscellaneous \$69,642,000
